

Administrative Information

Structure, governance and management

The method of appointment of PCC members is set out in the Church Representation Rules. All Church attendees are encouraged to register on the Electoral Roll and stand for election to the PCC.

Terms of Reference were reviewed and approved by the PCC in June 2018 for each of its sub-Committees and these are reviewed on an annual basis.

Objectives and Activities

St Martin's Parochial Church Council (the PCC) has the responsibility of co-operating with the incumbent, the Revd. Christine Dale, in promoting within the ecclesiastical parish of East Woodhay the whole mission of the Church, pastoral, evangelistic, social and ecumenical. It has maintenance responsibilities for the church building of St Martin's.

Committees and Sub-Committees

The PCC alone could not hope to manage all the tasks which arrive on its doorstep and therefore a number of groups and committees are there to assist. The Standing Committee meets between full meetings of the PCC and the others when necessary.

Apart from the Standing Committee, membership of the sub-committees is made up of PCC members and other church members. Sub-committees, other than Standing Committee, may co-opt members from outside the PCC.

Standing Committee

This is the only Committee required by law. It has power to transact the business of the PCC between its meetings, subject to any directions given by the council.

From 2006 the work of the Finance Committee, in reviewing financial strategy and recommending new fund-raising and stewardship initiatives to the PCC, formed part of the Standing Committee's remit.

The Fabric Sub-Committee

This is a committee elected by the PCC which meets as required to care for the fabric: i.e. buildings, fixtures and fittings of St Martin's Church, and to oversee the care of the churchyard.

It also oversees the Quinquennial Inspection and incorporates resulting works and other necessary maintenance into a five-year rolling programme agreed with the PCC. The Fabric Committee reviews the five-year plan annually following the Annual Meeting and presents it to the PCC for approval.

Membership: Toby Ward (Chairman), Don Beaver, Andrew Colville, as Churchwarden, Mick Phillips, Edward Reis and Stephen Harris was co-opted during the year.

Ex-officio: The Rector.

The Benefice Council

The Benefice Council was formed in 2009 at the time of the creation of the North West Hampshire Benefice. It meets three times a year to receive news from the parishes and to discuss matters relating to the Benefice as a whole. Members report back to their respective PCCs after each meeting.

Membership: The Rector (Chair), the Associate Priest, two representatives from each parish (St Martin's representatives being Richard Twallin and Andrew Colville). In addition one lay member of the Ministry Team has been co-opted as a non-voting member.

Electoral Roll

The Electoral Roll is a legal requirement of all parishes and is a list of the names and addresses of every person who can vote at the Annual Parochial Church Meeting. It also provides us with us a list of worshippers, which in turn is an indication of the strength of support at St Martin's. Membership is purely voluntary and it is necessary to apply to be enrolled. The roll is amended on an annual basis and a new roll is prepared every six years, along with the rest of the Church of England. The St Martin's roll was renewed in 2014 in time for the 2014 Annual Parochial Church Meeting. As at the 2018 APCM there were 73 names on the Church Electoral Roll.

Deanery Synod

On which the parish is represented by Colin Bonner and Ann Harris, continued under the enthusiastic direction of the new Area Dean, The Revd Craig Marshall of the Bright Waters benefice, to explore ways, for inclusion in the Deanery Mission Action Plan (dMAP), in which the parishes of Whitchurch Deanery can work more closely together to advance the Diocese's fourth Strategic Priority (SP4 – Belonging together in Christ); and continued actively to support the Deanery's links with the Ugandan Diocese of Mityana.

Review of the Year:

The full PCC met four times during the year. The Standing Committee and other sub-Committees met between meetings and the reports of their deliberations were received by the full PCC, discussed and decisions taken where necessary. The full PCC also received regular financial updates from the Honorary Treasurer. Meetings continued to be held in an atmosphere of good heartiness where members are able to speak their mind with decisions being reached in an affable and open way.

Worship:

We have maintained our high standard of liturgical worship during the year and this continues to be the spiritual hub around which the life of St Martin's revolves. The unfailing dedication of our Organist and Choir Master, Hugh Cobbe, and Choir has ensured that our musical tradition continues to make a key contribution to our expression of worship. Festival services continued to be highlights within the year. The overall monthly pattern of services for all our five parishes was adjusted from September 2018, the new schedule delivered for St Martin's the earlier time of 9.30am for the monthly family service, the time feedback had suggested was preferred, it was promoted in the parish and in the school, we continue to promote it outside with the Family Service banner, decorated with handprints by local school children (with thanks to Kristen Foxon for arranging for this to be displayed each month). Numbers for this service have maintained but significant new support has not been realised. Fellowship continues after both Family Services and Benefice Communion with coffee and our thanks to those who enable this to happen. The PCC is very grateful to all whose commitment contributed to the orderly running of our services during the year: the rota of flower arrangers who continue to enhance the beauty of our church; the bell ringers who summon the congregation to services; the kneeler group whose handiwork brings us comfort and inspiration; and the rota of sidesmen and women, readers, intercessors and sacristans who support and contribute to our services.

The Rector

Choir and Organ in 2018:

The two major events in the year to which the choir contributed were the licensing of Canon Marvin Bamforth at Highclere church on 7th October and the special concert of music related to the first World War at Woolton Hill on the day before Armistice Day. I would like to express our gratitude to Richard Foster and Kathleen Trewhella for standing in as organists during the two-month period in March and April when I was unable to play because of a broken arm. After some initial teething problems, the organ settled down following its overhaul in 2017 and has been sounding robust, with the benefit of its new pedal reed stop (an extension of the Trumpet) making itself felt.

I am glad to recollect that the end of 2018 saw me complete thirty years as organist and choirmaster of St Martin's which has been a great privilege and pleasure.

Health & Safety:

The fire extinguishers were serviced and a couple replaced.

Electrical inspections of circuits and appliances was carried out in November and a Certificate was produced Aluminium disabled ramps have been made to replace the rotten wooden ones and they are located in the Garden Shed

A new handrail has been installed in the Bell tower for safer access and light bulbs have been replaced **Toby Ward**

Property and Fabric Report:

Following on from the last report, the new metal steps were fitted in the spring of 2018 and the roof of the outside lavatory was also repaired at the same time.

Lesley Foden who was using the Bell Tower as a studio has decided to halt proceedings. She did manage however to organise a clear up of the Tower

Colin Thomas and his team carried out their annual gutter check in November and repaired a few slates and tiles on the roofs in the process

The organ was overhauled and given a complete service

An electrical fault with the organ switch was remedied; this had been an ongoing problem

The Autumn work party cleared up the Churchyard and gave the inside of the church a good clean and polish

The next Quinquennial inspection takes place in April 2019. The Fabric Committee Meeting held in September 2018 highlighted a few areas to sort out before the visit.

No longer do individual members dress particular window sills, instead the group happily comes together to fill the church with flowers for high days and holidays.

In addition, 2018 saw the group familiarise the new Head of St. Martin's school, Katy Bartlett into the practice of welcoming the children of St. Martin's and their parents into the church on Mothering Sunday through the making of 90 posies at the school prior to the event. The flower ladies supplied all the flowers and were on hand to assist the children with the exciting posy production. Good numbers of families were recorded at that service.

St Martin's Guild

St Martin's Guild was formed in 1908 to raise funds for the "beautification of the Church" by holding an annual Fete. The PCC supports this aim and works in collaboration with St Martin's Guild.

The 2018 Fete was held at Malverleys on 28th May. We would like to thank Georg and Emily von Opel for generously allowing us to use their grounds for the fete.

The Guild committee would like to thank everyone who was involved, not only with their assistance on the day, but also with the setting up and taking down. We have brilliant stallholders, tea ladies and sideshow helpers, without whom we would not be able to put on such a wonderful event. The committee is also very grateful for all those who support the Fete with donations to help with the costs, thus enabling us to raise more money.

Financial Review 2018

After three years of our Accounts, because of exceptional spending on capital projects and the timing of the receipt of associated grants, showing swings between substantial surpluses and substantial deficits, those for 2018 show a small surplus of just over £350. This is the smallest surplus of normal income over expenditure – i.e. running costs – since the present Treasurer took office (in 2010) because in a year in which our incidental, and historically cyclic, income – from donations, legacies, recordings and fees – was low, our two main income streams, Regular Giving and St Martin's Guild, were only just able to cover our ever rising expenses.

The PCC is hugely grateful to the generosity of our Regular Givers, to St Martin's Guild and all involved with the Fete and to Lesley Foden, who has taken over Recording arrangements, for keeping us afloat in 2018. As became apparent in the many Treasurers' meetings held across the benefice, the deanery and the diocese during the year, we were, in comparison with many other parishes remarkably fortunate in the size of these three income streams and to have been able to meet our commitments to the wider church, as well as to keep St Martin's active, welcoming and at the heart of our community, without drawing on reserves.

Outlook for 2019

However, fortunate as we are, our present levels of income will not meet the increased planned expenditure for 2019, which includes a Common Mission Fund allocation which increases, at the end of the Diocese's transition period to its Affluence Category/Worshiping Community system, by 14% to £27,664; and the PCC's prudent reluctance to rely on drawing on the £32,700 currently in our banks, to make up any shortfall, is reinforced by the uncertainties of the work, and expenses, which may result from the Ouinquennial Inspection due during the year.

In these circumstances, the PCC, as well as investigating further possibilities for fundraising events, has agreed that we need to increase our levels of regular giving to meet a greater proportion of our running costs and will shortly be launching a stewardship campaign to achieve this.

Reserves Policy

The PCC has not adopted a formal policy on reserves but a financial report monitoring the budget is received by the PCC at each of its meetings. The need for a formal reserves policy remains under review.

Related Trusts and Charities

The late Col. W T Sheppard Trust provides an annual income (£1,138.48 in 2017) which is the major regular contributor to the fund for the upkeep of the churchyard.

Definition of Funds

The table explains the purpose of each fund shown in the accounts.

In conclusion - from the Rector

It is a joy to report that in October we welcomed our new Associate Priest, the Revd Canon Marvin Bamforth, and his wife Sue, as they came to live among us and share our ministry. Marvin has brought with him much experience in parishes at home, and abroad, along with a lively interest in Uganda. My sincere thanks as ever to all my Ministry Team colleagues, all of whom were unstinting in support during the four years we were without a second priest in our team.

There have been some special moments during 2018. Harvest Festival for example followed by a wonderful community lunch in the village hall. Then on Remembrance Sunday we commemorated the centenary of the Armistice with a special extended Act of Remembrance at the memorial on East End green with friends from Woolton Hill, accompanied by the East Woodhay Silver Band. It was a firm reminder of the bonds which unite us, not just across our communities now, but also with those who have gone before. It was a joy therefore to receive on behalf of the church, at the centenary a book from the East Woodhay History Society, given to tell of the lives of those whose names are recorded on our war memorial.

In many ways the more visible parts of our life together: Sunday and Festival services, the Guild Fete and social occasions, school services and event – these are just the tip of an iceberg. There is so much that goes on to enable these which is simply hidden. This report offers insight into all that we work on together - it is clear from the reports presented by members of our church that there is much in which we may rejoice. So thank you to each and every one who has contributed to and made possible our worship and life together this last year.

For me it continues to be a privilege and a joy to share in the life of St Martin's Church, St Martin's School and the parish of East Woodhay.
